### Anna enjoyed a visit to the Southwood Gardens of St James's Church, Piccadilly, SW1.....

On a gorgeous August day recently I was making my way along Jermyn Street, SW1, towards the Royal Academy for the Summer Exhibition (fantastic, this year) and noticed a high wall and London Planes soaring above me into the brilliant blue sky. I thought, "Coffee time!", nipping directly into the café entrance which is part of the St James's Church (Wren designed) fabric. The famous courtyard was busy with tourists and office workers, many of whom were making their way up the steps to this secluded garden to enjoy their coffee or snack, the entrance to which sits a formal stone pool, flanked by two bronze children on dolphins. This charming feature commemorates Viscount Southwood, the philanthropist who commissioned the garden (formerly a bomb-damaged churchyard) after WW2, as a 'thank you' to Londoners for "their courage and fortitude", which was opened to the public by Queen Mary in 1946. On the upper level of the garden sits a secluded oasis, a triangular-shaped formal garden with four identical, raised grass areas, separated by pathways and benches in which to relax. The London Planes and Irish Yews surround the space, with new planting incorporated in 2011, as part of the 2012 Olympic legacy and it is a deserved recipient of a Green Flag Award. I was particularly impressed with the two generously designed, U-shaped yew hedges with seating incorporated for larger groups to congregate - a clever feature. Do visit on your next visit to Piccadilly, as you will be charmed, like I was!





# August Plants of the Month: Clematis 'Princess Diana' and Clematis 'Queen Mother' ('Zoqum') from Anna....

On my south-facing trellis I grow these two clematis as they like the same conditions and look extremely well together. I simply adore Clematis 'Princess Diana' as the flowers are so striking in colour and shape, being a rich, vibrant pink and trumpet-shaped. Clematis 'Queen Mother' is a nice contrast, with attractive dark-mauve, bell-shaped flowers and both have paler edges to their sepals.

They both generally start flowering in June but this year it was July, due to the cold spring and slug damage. Both like full sun or partial shade and grown in moist but well drained soil so occasionally I need to put the hose on them. I do deadhead for aesthetic reasons and in the hope that the flowering continues throughout August for C 'Princess Diana'. Once or twice in previous years this clematis has developed Clematis Wilt (leaves turning black and plant dying back) but has been relatively healthy for the last three years or so. The fantastically vigorous C 'Queen 'Mother' will flower almost continuously through to the end of October, perhaps resting for 2-3 weeks in September before flowering once again. I cannot praise this clematis enough. Both clematis are, unfortunately, only suitable for gardens without pets for obvious reasons.





### Pat's10 jobs for August

- 1. Give dahlias plenty of water and a feed and make sure to keep picking and deadheading regularly to keep the blooms coming.
- 2. Camellias and rhododendrons make next year's buds now but need plenty of water for this so don't forget to water at the roots.
- Take pelargonium cuttings now by cutting below a leaf node and inserting in free draining compost and keep in a shady place until they root. Please bring any spare rooted cuttings to our monthly plant sale.

- 4. Trim lavender back now trying not to cut into the old wood but leave a few stems to seed for the birds.
- 5. Rambling roses are making rampant growth now so thin out some of the old stems by cutting at the base and tie in the new growth.
- 6. Save seeds by deadheading stems and leaving upturned in a paper bag until completely dried out.
- 7. Watch out for late blight on tomatoes in the form of black blotches on the stems and remove plants immediately making sure not to add to the compost bin. Feed plants weekly with a tomato feed or make your own comfrey feed and when you water do it at the roots trying not to wet the foliage.
- 8. Make the best of gluts of crops by making pasta sauces for the freezer or chutneys and jams or sharing with family and friends. My neighbours are always pleased to get any spare veg.
- 9. Keep picking runner beans and French beans but look out for snails climbing and hiding on their supports and munching your crop.
- **10.** Pick chillies as soon as they are ripe as leaving them on the plants inhibits more flowers forming.
